WINTER EXHIBIT



MONTHLY PROGRAMS

Since Amherst County is celebrating its 250th anniversary in 2011, the Activities Committee of the Museum has planned exciting events around the county for you to enjoy all year. Set aside the **third Sunday afternoon of each month from 2:00-4:00 p.m.**

Christmas in Amherst, 1901 from the Richmond Dispatch, January 5, 1902

The Amherst People—What they Did Christmas— Personal Notes of Interest—Amherst, VA, January 4, 1902 (Special)

Christmas at Amherst has been unusually bright and pleasant socially for the young people this year.

The fun began Christmas night when there was an informal gathering of young folks at the home of Mr. and Mrs. C.L. Scott.

Monday evening the Misses Dearborn had a delightful reception, followed on Tuesday evening by a dance at the same hospitable home.

New-Year's night Miss Louise Scott and Messrs. Sam and Landon Scott entertained a large number of their friends at their home.

Among those present were Miss Leary McDonald, of Berryville, Miss Lucille Strode, of Lynchburg; Misses Mary and Sadie Dearborn, Katherine and Elizabeth Troy, Willie and Eva Wills, Bessie Robertson, and Emma Beard, of Amherst; Major W.J. Brodie, of Virginia Polytechnic Institute; Messrs Allen Hutcherson, of New York; Butler Claiborne, of New Glasgow; Charles Ellis, of High Point, N.C.; Ernest Landidge, W.K. Allen, Joseph Dobbs, W.H. Kent, Jr.; Walter Beard, Arthur Gray, of Amherst; Mr. and Mrs. S.S. Hopkins, Misses Pollard and Taylor, of Alexandria, and Fannie Claiborne, of New Glasgow.

The last of the entertainments was that given by Miss Bessie Robertson.

On Tuesday night there was a Christmas-tree for the Sunday school of the Methodist church, at which there was a large crowd present.

New in our Collections

The Carpenter collection, donated by Jane Carpenter Hollingsworth, is mostly agricultural items, but below are a few exceptions.

Phyllis Ragland has donated several World War II items in memory of James Otis McCormick (at right). The collection includes a number of patches of military insignia.



The week before her death, Ann Loving donated the Elon Home Demonstration Club scrapbook from Amherst County's Bicentennial in 1961. The Museum now owns five of the Home Demonstration Club scrapbooks and they have been invaluable in planning for next year's 250th birthday of Amherst County.

History Tech, formerly The Antiquaries, has provided the Museum with copies of their survey work and notes from the Historic Resources Survey completed earlier this year. The bound report contains excellent summaries of the county's resources and is full of photos. The package includes DVDs of the photographs as well.

Our volunteers have completed another major project—an index to Amherst County's Agricultural Census of 1880. This can be downloaded from the Museum's website by going to the Library Resources page. Both 1870 and 1880 are now complete!

May 1, 1761, was a Friday.


It was also the birth of Amherst County, a significant event for Virginia lands along the upper James River. It was carved out of Albemarle County which had been established in 1744. At the same time Amherst County was born, Albemarle also "gave birth" to another county—Buckingham. These "twin" counties, Amherst and Buckingham, were the first two of Albemarle's "daughter" counties, Fluvanna being created some years later in 1777.

In the 1740s one finds a number of lands being surveyed and patented in the area that would become Amherst County. Many of these lands were patented by men speculating in the real estate market, some by men looking for newer and richer lands for planting. By this time the lands in the tidewater region of Virginia were already claimed and some were beginning to feel the effects of overplanting. Both corn and tobacco wear out a land's nutrients and the soil will be depleted unless replenished. Some of these new western frontier men did both speculation and planting.

Some of the men who surveyed lands in the Albemarle area that would become Amherst are names still familiar to residents today—William Cabell, Thomas Jefferson and Thomas Turpin. In the 1750s John Smith, Jr. and Jonathan Staples would be surveying in the area as well. Early landowners also included names well known to us today—Robert Horsley, John Harvey, Nicholas Davis, Edward Watts, Aaron Higginbotham, James Christian, Robert Rose, Charles Lynch and more. The men who surveyed the lands were in the best position to see the potential fertile lands and made their claims accordingly.


As lands became settled the need for roads grew and some of the earliest records provide clues about the settling of the area. As early as 1745 one can find references to mills and ferries. In 1747 William Cabell gave bond to keep an *ordinary* at his ferry. (An *ordinary* was a building that provided lodging, meals and stables for travelers.)
