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## Nutumn Apples

The 1870 Agricultural Census lists 139 growers of orchard products but does not separate apples from peaches. The majority of the orchardists worked them on a small scale, as a sideline, producing between 10 and 50 dollars worth of fruit, but several produced amounts much larger: in the Pedlar district (Coolwell post office) Samuel Irvine produced 500, George W. Dodd, 400, Joseph Massie 360 and Robert Wilmore 350; in the Temperance district (New Glasgow post office) John S. Tucker 300, Wilkerson Ware 250 and Samuel Watts also 250; and in the Temperance district (Temperance post office) Robert Henley produced 750, Daniel Miller 500 and Charles Smith 250.

At left, Tom Burford, the Smithsonian's apple expert, donates a Ralls Genet apple tree sapling the Museum in November, 2009. This sapling was planted a bit to the front and side of the Museum's "Tyler Schoolhouse," it being deemed a good place to grow apples for the teacher.

The Museum's newest publication, *Miss Christine's Monroe*, is based on a scrapbook kept by Christine McIvor Smith (1898-1988), in which she kept articles and photographs about Monroe. She added her own notes and comments in the margins. The book itself in the property of her sister, Mary McIvor Andrews, was graciously loaned to the Museum for publication in order for it to be shared more broadly.

The first page of *Miss Christine's Monroe* describes how Burford's station's name was changed to Winesap because of the great number of winesap apples shipped from there.

Apple Peeling Jelly, contributed by Arleen Jennings — Select good tart apple peelings, cover with water and cook until tender. Let stand a short time, pour off water and save. Meansure 17 cups of juice and add 1 large can pineapple juice and 3 boxes Sure-Jell; bring to a boil and boil 1 minute add 21 cups sugar. Bring to a boil and boil 1 minute or until it sheets off spoon. Pour in hot glasses and seal.

### Miss Christine's Monroe

Now available in the Museum's Gift Shop — \$10 (includes tax)

One great of quick line, one pint of strong one give of opinits of Europentine, two ambeer, one gile of spirits of Europentine, two quarts of sweet new milk, one pound of brown organ. Mise the compound well, and in the month of May or gune paint the basies of the trees.

Apple tree wash—One quart of quick lime, one pint of strong amber, one gill of spirits of turpentine, two quarts of sweet new milk, one pound of brown sugar. Mix the compound well, and in the month of May or June paint the bodies of the trees.

Quoted from *Meehan's Monthly*, July, 1896, page 136: Apple, Rawle's Janet or Ralls' Genet.—In your May issue you state: "It has always been understood that one of the apples indicated was raised by Mr. Caleb Rawls, in Amherst Co., Virginia, and that he named it for his daughter, Janet." In the report of Dr. Howsley... we find the following: "Rawle' Genet is th proper spelling of the name of this apple, and not Janet, as it is usually spelled." ... Briefly stated, Thos. Jefferson became acquainted with this apple during the administration of General Washington. M. Genet was sent to this country as Minister of the French Government.

M. Genet had apples of the variety in question sent him from France for his own use. Mr. Jefferson so admired this apple that he procured scions and gave them to a Mr. Rawles (Ralls), a nurseryman and fruit grower, of Virginia, for propagation....

A letter from Chas. L. Ellis, Clerk of Amherst County Court, Va., ...February 14, 1892, in reply to an inquiry as to the spelling of Caleb Rawles' name, stated that it was spelled R-a-l-l-s. ... Mr. Wm. Sandidge, the present Clerk of Amherst County Court, Va., states: "I find the name "Rawles" of record in this office in several instances, but no "Caleb Rawles." The name "Caleb Ralls" appears several times. We believe these are "good and sufficient" reasons for the name Ralls Genet, as used by the division of Pomology.
